Clinical use of the data determines and builds on the older client’s strengths and fosters personal growth. Thirteen references.

Very sensitive appraisal of spirituality in people with dementia, how spirituality is expressed and the need for us to help people with dementia find themselves.

Abstract Illustrates how religion and spirituality can be related to people with dementia and how churches as organisations can assist them. Also covers ways of minimising communication difficulties and the provision of simple services for people with dementia living in residential care. Touches on the problems which may occur when a practising minister develops dementia. Twelve references.

Abstract Collection of papers written in response to an article in Nursing Times on the place of spirituality in nursing care. Papers introduced by Steve Wright of the Sacred Space Project in an article called ‘The Awakenings’ (four references). This is followed by: ‘Cry Freedom’ by Trevor Emdon who asks nurses not to hide or suppress their spirituality (seven references); ‘The Search Inside’ by Jennifer Hall who explains how to achieve a spiritual mode of caring; and ‘A Christian Path’ by Owen Bennett which outlines how Christianity affects nursing care.

Challenges this view in the light of individuals and communities with cultural and religious backgrounds contrary to Christian cultures. Eleven references.

Abstract Explores Foucault’s thinking on nutrition from scientific and spiritual perspectives. Not specific to dementia but of interest. 51 references.

Abstract Study that finds that older people are a highly spiritual and religious group.

Abstract Paper presenting a model of spiritual care education for nurses. 64 references.

Abstract Looks at the importance of maintaining spiritual well-being as part of caring for the whole person. Not specific to people with dementia, but the issue and discussion is relevant. Twelve references.

Abstract Reports on the launch of a second project on spiritual needs of people with dementia managed by the Christian Council on Ageing. This project aims to provide help and advice to anyone with a responsibility for providing holistic care to people with dementia. CCOA’s first project was largely inspired by Christian concerns. This project aims to work with others to ensure that people with dementia, of all faiths or none, have their spiritual needs recognised and addressed.

Abstract Study investigating whether religious doubt is related to psychological well-being and testing whether age is a factor of any relationship. Findings suggest that spiritual doubt is associated with greater distress and low sense of well-being; this has implications for service planners. Relevant but not specific to dementia. 44 references.

Abstract Reviews the link between spirituality and health in elderly people and asks whether the fall in church attendance has added to the social services workload. One reference.

Abstract Reviews the place of a spiritual dimension in care planning. Nine references.

Abstract Looks at the place of establishing a sense of personhood and individual spirituality with people with dementia. Three appendices: 'Religious, spiritual and sacred center assessment of compassionate connectedness'; 'Activity-focused adapted worship guidelines'; and 'Opportunities for sharing ministry – dementia care centres and local congregations'. Abstract Inquiry group reports on meetings to explore the lack of clarity surrounding the nature of spirituality and spiritual care, and its importance to person-centred care. Related to dementia care. Nineteen references.

Abstract Explains the tools used to communicate with people about their spirituality. Relevant to people with dementia. Six references.

Abstract Looks at how real communication in dementia care requires a meeting or a relationship at depth in the moment, a kind of spirituality that often acknowledges and affirms the unseen nature of a person. Fourteen references.

Abstract Study aimed at describing what nurses consider to be spiritual needs, how nurses respond to these needs, typifying nurses' involvement in the spiritual dimension of care and illustrating the effect of nurses' intervention in this area. Concludes that a model of spiritual care may be developed from this study. Relevant to person-centred care of the person with dementia. 35 references.
